2021 Volunteer Award Presented to Judy Izenberg



The Donna Holt Siemiatkoski Genealogy Volunteer Award is presented biennially to an individual who has provided outstanding volunteer service to the New England Regional Genealogical Consortium or its member societies, and as such to the field of genealogy, over and above the job to which they were elected or appointed to do. The 2021 award was presented to Judy Izenberg of the Jewish Genealogical Society of Greater Boston (JGSGB). Citing her active and ongoing participation in JGSGB, the award recognized Judy as the consummate genealogy volunteer—organized, creative, smart, persistent, collegial, good humored, outgoing, generous with her time, skills and guidance:

- JGSGB board member since 2003.
- JGSGB Hospitality Chair, with responsibilities including set-up for meetings and greeting members.
- Monitor of JGSGB telephone system, including responding to calls that come in or sending them to the appropriate person.
- Outreach Speaker—speaking at temples, libraries, retirement communities about Jewish Genealogy.
- Program Committee member—developed evaluation form used to gain feedback from members for assessment of Sunday lecture programs.
- Volunteer coordinator for 2013 International Association of Jewish Genealogical Society in Boston, which saw over 1,000 attendees.
- Planning committee member for the 25th and 36th JGSGB anniversary events—organized displays by members.
- Member of the JGSGB board Nominating Committee.
- Coach for the JGSGB award-winning course, Jewish Genealogy: Discover Your Family History
- Developed and led genealogy course for middle schoolers.
- Developed "buddy system" pairing new JGSGB members with veteran members.
- Former Society Librarian and archivist of the *Mass-Pocha*, the JGSGB journal.
- Created displays about aspects of Jewish genealogy for Newton Library, Brookline Library and Temple Israel of Boston to promote doing genealogical research.
- JGSGB representative to NERGC, promoting the attendance of JGSGB members to NERGC conferences, and assisting at NERGC biennial conferences.

For more than 13 years, Judy has served as the JGSGB delegate to NERGC, and has sat on the NERGC Board of Directors for nine years. During this time, Judy has held several roles at the NERGC biennial conferences. She has been responsible for the purchase of the tote bags distributed to attendees and served as a room monitor, where she introduced speakers, greeted attendees and collected evaluations. She has also worked on the committee that entered evaluation data into spreadsheets.

While the above are Judy's accomplishments as an integral member of the New England genealogy community, they only hint at is the kindness and humanity that Judy brings to every responsibility she assumes, including delivering Meals on Wheels and other community activities, such as tutoring for English as a second language. Judy never expects kudos, but she is well deserving—she is a doer. The JGSGB is blessed to have exceptional volunteers. Judy Izenberg is at the top of this list. We greatly appreciate all that she has done for the New England genealogical community through her work with JGSGB and NERGC.

Dr. Michael D. Lacopo



Michel Lacopo is a retired small-animal veterinarian born and raised in northern Indiana. He takes a scientific approach to his research as he does to his profession. Researching since 1980, he has lectured internationally and written for numerous periodicals and journals. Combing libraries, archives, cemeteries and courthouses as a teenager, Michael gained the skills needed to become a keen researcher. His first major challenge was tackled by finding his adopted mother's birthparents in 1982. A self-described "all-American mutt," his research skills cover a broad range of topics with focus on genetic genealogy, social history, German and Swiss research, especially as it pertains to the 18th century emigration to Pennsylvania, and more.

Rich Venezia, formerly of Pittsburgh, now of Philadelphia, is a leading expert in twentieth-century immigration research and records, especially underutilized record sources and federal records. He was a member of *Genealogy Roadshow*'s research team for two seasons. He also conducts research for those with Italian and Irish ancestry and makes annual research trips to Europe. Additionally, he assists clients with dual citizenship for both Ireland and Italy. He received his Certificate in Genealogical Research from Boston University in 2015. He lectures nationally and spoke about "How to Grow Empathy from Uncovering Your Roots" at TEDx Pittsburgh 2017. He was a course coordinator at SLIG 2019 and an instructor at SLIG 2018. He coordinated the #RecordsNotRevenue campaign in late 2019 and early 2020, which received international press and garnered him the Shirley M.
