# WEDNESDAY ACTIVITIES

Our pre-conference activities on Wednesday include four special research tracks—Revolutionary War, French-Canadian Research, Advanced DNA, and Jumpstart Your Research. Each track costs \$50, does not require conference registration, and will include four sessions and a lunch break with an optional on-site meal available. These sessions often appeal to a smaller audience and thus might not otherwise be included in a large conference.

In addition, we're offering four workshops late Wednesday afternoon (4:30-6:30) for those who can arrive on Wednesday or come after work. The topics include writing, land records, census reports, and working with photographs. Attending a workshop on Wednesday gives you more opportunity to enjoy as many as 19 sessions during the three-day conference! The cost of the workshops is \$30 and does not require conference registration.

# SPRINGFIELD, MASSACHUSETTS—THE CITY OF FIRSTS

From its founding in 1635, Springfield has rightly claimed the title "City of Firsts."

From the first book banned in the American colonies to the newspaper that first published the poems of Emily Dickinson and the first Webster dictionary, from ice skates and bicycles to automobiles and motorcycles, from the rifles developed at the first armory in the U.S. to the manufacture of Smith and Wesson handguns—all took place in Springfield.

It is possible to investigate some of these firsts at locations within walking distance of NERGC hotels and the MassMutual Center.

• Lyman and Merrie Wood Museum of Springfield History (21 Edwards Street; <a href="www.springfieldmuseums.org">www.springfieldmuseums.org</a>) is known for its local history research facilities, its changing exhibitions, and its wide-ranging collections illuminating the history of the Connecticut River Valley. The Indian Motorcycle Collection is the largest collection of Indian cycles and memorabilia in the world. The Firearms Collection includes more than 1,600 firearms (the largest collection of Smith & Wesson guns in the world). The Automobile Collection includes an 1899 Knox, a 1901 Crestmobile, and Rolls-Royce roadsters from 1925 and 1928.

features family-friendly, interactive exhibits exploring Dr. Seuss's Springfield roots and provides opportunities to experiment with new sounds and vocabulary, play rhyming games, and invent stories—all in line with Geisel's revolutionary role in changing how we learn to read. The second floor recreates Geisel's studio and living room (with the furniture and art materials he actually used) and features art, family photographs, and letters, plus the original Geisel Grove sign (which used to hang in Forest Park). You can even find Theophrastus, the toy stuffed dog Ted Geisel's mother gave him when he was a boy in Springfield.

No time for a visit to the museum? Check out the outdoor **Dr. Seuss National Memorial Sculpture Garden**, where the Cat in the Hat, the Grinch, and other beloved Dr. Seuss characters are immortalized in bronze,

life-size statues

- **Duryea Way** (between Worthington and Taylor Streets) displays a copy of an early automobile that marks where Frank Duryea built America's first gasoline powered car.
- Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame (1000 Hall of Fame Way; <a href="www.hoophall.com">www.hoophall.com</a>) highlights the story of basketball, invented in 1891 in Springfield by Dr. James Naismith, and celebrates over 200 inductees with exhibits and interactive displays.
- Springfield Armory National Historic Site, One Armory Square, commemorates the critical role of the nation's first armory by preserving and interpreting the world's largest collection of historic U.S. military small-arms (along with an excellent archives).

# **EXHIBIT HALL UPDATE**

As of January 16, we have thirty-four exhibitors including Family Tree DNA; Fun Stuff for Genealogists, which offers tons of useful things for the genealogist and family historian; Genealogy House Publishers, who can help turn your family stories ad genealogy into a compelling narrative that will be treasured for generations to come; and New England Ancestors/American Ancestors Since some exhibitors have requested more than one standard-size booth, this means we have actually sold a total of forty-two standard-size booth spaces. So far, four of the exhibitors have stated they will be offering door prices of some kind.

Assignment of booth spaces has not been done yet, but the process will begin soon. The Early Bird discount on booth purchases ended on December 31, but we still have booth spaces available. She will share information geared to your needs providing details covering the sessions workshops, meals, and exhibit spaces. She will share instructions for entering, parking, and details about available accessible rooms hotel rooms as well as community access from the hotels to the venue. Pam or an accessibility team volunteer will call or email you to design an access plan to help you enjoy your conference experience.

To take the fullest advantage of the accessibility options available, please register during the Early Bird Registration period ending February 15. While we will try to meet your requests whenever you make the decision to register, our ability to meet your needs may be limited, especially if your request comes after April 12, 2023. Referral for rental of scooters and wheelchairs is a possibility before April 12. We have a vendor offering rental fee and we can arrange discounted delivery to the

conference center or either of our conference hotels. Other accommodations typically available at the event include reserved seating, source files as possibly accommodations to for those using personal screen reading on their devices, and microphones will be available in most spaces.
