HOW TO REGISTER FOR NERGC 2023

The cost of Full Registration is \$190 on or before February 15 or \$210 February 16 and after.

You can register and pay by credit card at https://nergc.org/registration. Note that online selection of session preferences and a conference app will not be available until February. Registrants will be contacted when they become available.

OR

By Mail

When you are ready to register, you can fill out and mail the last page of the brochure, along with your check, to the address given.

Note: Those entitled to free admission, such as speakers, exhibitors, and award winners, will be emailed a discount code to be used during online registration to deduct the cost of their ticket. Those in these categories know who they are and should wait for that code before registering.

HOTEL UPDATE

NERGC has reserved blocks of rooms at two hotels in Springfield, walkable to the conference, a Sheraton and a Marriott.

Sheraton Springfield Monarch Place Hotel (\$179/night, last day to book is April 11) One Monarch Place, Springfield, MA 01144. Mention that you are booking for the "New England Regional Genealogical Consortium" to get the negotiated conference rate. (Note: the link will say "Marriott" because Sheraton is owned by Marriott International.)

WORKSHOPS AT NERGC 2023

Workshops at NERGC are longer sessions with smaller audiences. They offer the attendee a chance to delve into a subject with an expert instructor for a full two hours! This year we're offering two types of workshops—pre-conference and conference.

Wednesday's pre-conference workshops run from 4:30-6:30 at a cost of \$30. These are set up for those who can attend after other pre-conference activities, those who can come after work, and those who arrive early for the conference. The four topics are Proof Arguments, New England Land Records, Solving Photo Mysteries, and Clues from the Census.

One conference workshop is offered each day for those who register for the full or one-day conference. These come with an added cost of \$25. Thursday's option is from 8:00-10:00 in the morning for "Getting Into Genealogy," a great way for a beginner to get started before enjoying the remainder of the conference! Friday's workshop is "Principals of Source Documentation Made Easy" from 8:30-10:30 in the morning. On Saturday, the workshop option is from 1:45-3:45 in the afternoon—"U.S. Catholic Records."

Digital materials for each workshop will be distributed at the end of April to those who register for the workshop. We certainly hope one of these will be of interest to you, but there are also 100 sessions to choose from as part of the conference. Join us for Genealogy Fun in Springfield, Massachusetts!

WEDNESDAY ACTIVITIES

Our pre-conference activities on Wednesday include four special research tracks—Revolutionary War, French-Canadian Research, Advanced DNA, and Jumpstart Your Research. Each track costs \$50, does not require conference registration, and will include four sessions and a lunch break with an optional on-site meal available. These sessions often appeal to a smaller audience and thus might not otherwise be included in a large conference.

In addition, we're offering four workshops late Wednesday afternoon (4:30-6:30) for those who can arrive on Wednesday or come after work. The topics include writing, land records, census reports, and working with photographs. Attending a workshop on Wednesday gives you more opportunity to enjoy as many as 19 sessions during the three-day conference! The cost of the workshops is \$30 and does not require conference registration.

MEALS FOR WEDNESDAY PRE-CONFERENCE

The Meals Committee worked with the MassMutual Center to provide box lunches for the pre-conference on Wednesday. The box lunch will contain a sandwich, chips, salad, cookie, and a bottle of water. The choices of sandwiches are:

Purchasing the box lunch for \$33.00 and staying in the MMC will allow time for a relaxing lunch plus the opportunity to talk with colleagues who attended the pre-conference workshop.

The MassMutual Center assures us that they will provide for special dietary needs. Gluten-free bread is available. For non-dairy guests, they can prepare sandwiches without cheese. For those attending the Friday luncheon with Table Topics, the chicken salad will be grilled sliced chicken and the protein on the vegetarian salad will be quinoa and chickpeas. They will serve a vegetarian and gluten-free soup of fresh greens and legumes.

Please note that the conference syllabus will not include any handouts for the optional workshops or Wednesday preconference activities. Any handouts related to those activities will be distributed separately to those who registered for those activities.

The printed syllabus and flash drive will not be available for sale at the Conference. A printed NERGC syllabus is a genealogical resource you will consult many times over the years. Springfield: Historic and Architectural Sites

If you need a short break from sitting through so many exciting lectures, consider taking a short walk around the neighborhood to investigate some of Springfield's architectural treasures.

Pride runs deep in Springfield, which is a diverse city where neighbors work together to make a better community. Springfield is known as the "City of Homes" for its Victorian mansions and collection of unique architecture as well as the multitude of single-family homes constructed for manufacturing workers in the late 19th and early 20th centuries.

Court Square (Main & Court Streets) is surrounded by several noteworthy buildings. Old First Church (1819) was the fourth meeting house on the site dating back to 1637. Neo-Classical City Hall and Symphony Hall (1909) flank the Campanile, a bell and clock tower similar to St. Mark's in Venice, Italy. Bronze bas-reliefs of Springfield history adorn the front doors. The granite former county courthouse (1871) was designed by important 19th century architect H. H. Richardson. The elaborate Court Square Building (1892) is slated to be renovated for housing. One of the oldest commercial buildings remaining in the city is the small brick Byers Block (1835). The President McKinley Memorial is located behind the church.

Duryea Way (between Worthing and Taylor Streets)—A copy of an early automobile marks where Frank Duryea built America's first gasoline powered car. The second Duryea car was built just around the corner in the Stacy building (1830) at 49 Taylor Street.

Historic Mattoon Street (Mattoon & Elliot Streets)—Developed between 1870 and 1890, Mattoon Street is one of the few in the region with high style brick Victorian row houses. Former Postmaster General Lawrence O'Brien grew up at 42 Mattoon Street. The brownstone church was designed by H. H. Richardson and features Tiffany windows.

Merrick Park & The Puritan Sculpture (Chestnut & State Streets)— The bronze statue of Samuel Chapin, one of Springfield's founders, was created by famous sculptor Augustus Saint-Gaudens. Bordering the park are the Renaissance Revival Central Library (1909) and the brownstone Christ Church Episcopal Church (1874). Across State Street is one of Springfield's architectural gems designed by the noted Boston architectural firm of Peabody and Stearns.

LIBRARIES, ARCHIVES, AND MUSEUMS SHOWCASE

The interest in our Libraries, Archives & Museums Showcase has been amazing. Since our last E-zine, we have added two new participants: Kent Memorial Library of Suffield, Connecticut., and the Windsor Historical Society—the cornerstone of the event, as this will be their fourth appearance.

Here are write-ups of the of the collections the Wilbraham Library and Windsor Historical Society will be presenting:

The Wilbraham Public Library is pleased to showcase a selection of materials from their Local History Collection including photographs, manuscripts, and Town Reports going back to 1876, and finding aids created by staff based on the most common questions received. The photographs in particular show a variety of people and places in Wilbraham and the South Parish (present-day Hampden) which, together with printed materials and manuscripts in the collection, are a treasure trove for genealogists and local historians.

Windsor Historical Society's research library and archives house extensive historical resources relating to the town of Windsor and its people, as well as materials that explore topics of local and regional interest. Highlights include thousands of historic photographs, 17th- to 20th-century primary documents, (many indexed by date and family name), more than 350 published genealogies of Windsor-related families, copies of local cemetery records and vital records, regional and state histories, town reports, local newspapers, school yearbooks, city directories, and maps, among many other resources.

NERGC continues to encourage libraries, archives, and museums with special collections of interest to genealogists and researchers to join us in Springfield. One table, two chairs, and signage are available at no cost for informational exhibits about special collections, Friday and Saturday, May 5th and 6th, from 10 a.m. to 3 pm. Potential attendees or registrants with mobility, hearing, or visual concerns impacting access and participation at this conference are welcome to contact Pam Roberts, NERGC 2023 Accessibility Liaison, BY EMAIL (accessibility@nergc.org) at your earliest convenience. Thank you if you have already connected!

- If you are already registered and filled out the registration form with accessibility items identifying your needs, Pam will email you to arrange a call scheduled on Eastern Time Zone to clarify your needs. If you identified dietary needs on your registration, those responses are also sent to Fran Nadeau, Meals Chair, who will be in touch with you.
- Once Pam communicates by email giving her cell number, you are welcome to call her directly using audio call, virtual call, VM (or Text if you don't get through). Some of you may want assurances of how we can meet your needs BEFORE February 15 when Early Bird registration closes. The best time to reach Pam is from 10:00 a.m. through 2:00 p.m. most days, especially February 10 through 13 as you work toward confirming your needs before February 15.
- Note that eventually for all with an accessibility plan, Pam will need your itinerary or "agenda" your choices of topic/presenters for each session time slot, Thursday through Saturday, for your chosen track on Wednesday, if any, as well as any workshops Wednesday through Saturday. Once you register, you will be given the opportunity to fill out your agenda on the Whova conference mobile app. Pam can also assist you with that should you need help. Making your session choices no later than March 20th will be important to her implementation of the plans made for you for access to accommodation. Note that some people find it easier to use a website version of the app. Should you wish to use the computer website version of the app, contact Pam, who can assist you. She also can administratively assist your choices and will have access to choices you make in the app.
- Pam will share instructions for entering, parking, and details about the accessible hotel rooms. Information about the clear, accessible pedestrian way to and from the venue will be available one month prior to the event. However, Pam is glad to share information important to your decision to register whenever your questions arise and before online registration closes as well as onsite if we can help in small ways, but all equipment, large print, or interpreter accommodations must be set up prior to the conference opening and will not be available onsite unless prearranged.

We aim to welcome all and hope we can assist you in having an awesome, accessible experience at NERGC 2023. During the conference, we will have an accessibility table presence in the welcome area near Registration on the first floor of the MassMutual Center starting on Wednesday and running through Saturday evening. Storage space for the pick-up of equipment arranged by Pam will be available through Monday morning.
